Will Watt Fellow and a Benefactor. He has received the Rotarian of the Year honor twice and the Augusta West Rotary Club was named Rotary Club of the Year under his leadership.

"I am just honored as I can be," Simon said of being chosen as the 2005-06 District Governor.

Thunderbird Has Arrived at Showroom

The raffle car, a torch red 2003 Thunderbird convertible, has been delivered to the Ford automotive dealership in Kingsland (Camden County), Ga.

As of Jan. 17, 525 raffle tickets had been sold. The clubs leading in sales are St. Simons Island with 186, Skidaway with 155 and Perry with 60 (this includes 25 sales not yet recorded), according to Bill Turbeville.

Mr. Turbeville shares two success stories that other clubs and Rotarians might find useful in selling the raffle tickets:

The Skidaway Island Rotary Club sold tickets at two community events, one of which was a regular club fundraiser.

During a community symphony concert, 55 tickets were sold. The club borrowed a new Thunderbird convertible from a local Ford dealer, set up a display and a sales table. They also had a large banner made to help attract attention. A credit card unit was

available for those choosing to charge their purchases, which Turbeville says is important to make it easy to charge purchases.

During a second event, The Skidaway Island Rotary Club sold 60 tickets using the same props, etc. The second event was the club's regular Rotary fund-raising barbecue. The club also made a \$1,000 profit on barbecue sales!

In both cases, the tickets were sold mostly to non-Rotarians. Skidaway Island plans to have another barbecue in the spring using the same sales technique.

Skidaway Island Rotary Club's goal is to sell 300 tickets for the District 6920 Raffle.

"Good going for a club with 45 members," said Turbeville.

Another success story involves the efforts of a single Rotarian.

Raffle chairman DGN John Parkins has had great results in selling raffle tickets by sending a personal letter to selected friends, former business contacts and relatives seeking their help for Rotary in completely eradicating polio worldwide by 2005. He enclosed in each letter two raffle tickets with the stubs filled out.

the "Fulfilling Our Promise" polio brochure and a stamped self-addressed envelope for return of the ticket stubs and a check for the tickets.

"This has really worked," said Turbeville. "He has sold 91 tickets to mostly non-Rotarians.

"We encourage you to develop your own program or follow the above examples and tell us about your successes," added Turbeville.

Remember to send in your ticket stubs and money on the first and 15th of each month to Mr. Turbeville.

Tickets are available on the district Web site for \$50 each and can be paid for by credit card or check on-line. Tickets also can be purchased by contacting Mr. Turbeville. Each Rotarian is encouraged to invest in at least two tickets, with up to 80 percent of the cost of the tickets applied to the Rotarian's Rotary Foundation Paul Harris Fellowship account.

The drawing will be held at the Rotary District Conference on May 3.

District Updates

District Designated Funds' Focus to Shift to Aid More

In the recent past, District 6920 has used extensive amounts of District Designated Funds to fund scholarships, including Rotary Peace Scholars, Cultural Exchange Scholarships and others. The district has also participated in humanitarian efforts across the globe. More recently, it has been pointed out that the district can impact more people with funds used in humanitarian efforts than with scholarships. Therefore, over the next few years, the focus of the budgeting of the district designated funds will change. More funds will be spent on matching grants and other humanitarian grants rather than scholarships. Scholarships will not be eliminated, but less money will be allocated for scholarships.

"More [money] will go to help people in areas where help is badly needed in the form of basic necessities for life," said DGE Leon Benefield.

Club Extension

A study by DGN John Parkins last year indicated that Rotary penetration (clubs per population) needs to be improved in midsized communities within the district. Small and large cities and towns have a more favorable penetration by Rotary than do midsize communities. The focus of starting new Rotary clubs should be in midsize communities where a Rotary Club already exists. Associated with the topic of growth in clubs is the topic of membership retention. DG Montgomery has in place a "Red Badge" program that encourages new member orientations and has the possibility of impacting retention.

Rotary Foundation Goals for Coming Year

The Rotary Foundation Annual Fund goal for 2003-04 will be \$100 for each member in the district. Currently,

that would be approximately \$400,000. The Rotary Foundation Permanent Fund goal for 2003-04 will be contributions and bequests of at least \$50,000. PolioPlus pledges will continue with two years remaining for each Rotarian to pledge and pay \$67 over a three-year period.


