Rotary International's incoming president, William B. Boyd, has chosen *Lead the Way* as the theme for the 2006–07 Rotary year.

"This will be my theme and an affirmation of my belief in the power of Rotarians to change the world, one positive act at a time," he told incoming district governors at the International Assembly in San Diego, Ca., in February.

The challenge of finding a theme is that it must be short, inspirational and translatable. Boyd doesn't remember the moment *Lead the Way* popped into his head. All he knows is that "it just felt right."

"In the coming year, I ask each of you to take your places as leaders in your districts and your communities," Boyd told the incoming governors. "I ask each of you to lead in the Rotary way, by living as role



friendliness and a smile, so that others will be happy to walk beside you."

Boyd concluded by saying, "As Rotarians, we are not content to let matters stay the way they have always been in our clubs or in our communities. We are not content with the status quo, and we do not look at a problem only to say someone else will solve it. We are the ones who ask, 'Why not us?' We are the ones with the skills and the desire to build a better future. And we are the ones who must *Lead the Way*."

The following has been extracted from the July 2006 RI Zones 33-34 newsletter and is written by Past Director Ken Morgan

So what does a director do during his term, other than many miles of driving, many airline flights and worn out suitcases? Here are a few of the highlights of the past two years.

- Providing leadership to two Zone Institutes and closely working with two Executive Committees.
- Visiting projects in Caribbean Districts 7020 and 7030, and attending a Centennial Celebration in D7000, Puerto Rico.
- Serving as Assistant Moderator in 2005 and Moderator in 2006 for the RI BOD Orientation sessions.

• Multi-District PETS: I am a big believer in the strength of districts working together on training and projects that can be strengthened through the synergy of two or more districts working together. As we close out the year, the eight districts in Florida are now part of Florida PETS; the three districts in Georgia are working together on Peach State PETS; and seven districts in North Carolina and South Carolina continue as part of Carolinas' PETS. The two districts in West Virginia are part of West Virginia PETS and two districts in Virginia are cooperating on PETS. So, 22 of our 27 districts are now part of a multi-district PETS.

• Foundation Leadership Seminar: Beginning in 2001, the 13 districts in Zone 33 have been meeting for Rotary Foundation training. This event began in 2001 with about 20 district Foundation leaders and this year had over 100 participants. Under the leadership of Rocky Jacobs in 2004 and 2005 and Anne Matthews in 2006, Zone 33 has become a model for training of district Foundation leadership teams. Zone 34 is now conducting a training seminar in Evanston, under the leadership of RRFC John Smarge.

• International PolioPlus Committee: It has been my honor to serve on the International PolioPlus Committee (IPPC) during my two years on the Board. Under the leadership of past RI vice president, Bill Sergeant, the IPPC provides the leadership for the polio eradication efforts.

This is going to sound like a LONG Academy Awards acceptance speech but here it is, sincere and from the heart. Thanks to all our friends and family that have kept us in their constant prayers for our safe travels during this journey of many miles in Zones 33 & 34, trips back and forth to Evanston, and around the world during the past two years.
