Coins for Alzheimer's Research Trust (CART)

Established in 1995, CART has raised close to \$2 million for research which will lead to the prevention or cure of Alzheimer's Disease. The program was initiated by The Rotary Club of Sumter, S.C., then adopted by District 7770. It has now spread to all of the Rotary Districts in South Carolina, North Carolina and Georgia. Through these efforts, the CART Fund has made grants of nearly \$2 million. The program simply asks Rotarians to donate their loose change at their weekly meeting.

PDG Bruce Montgomery, the district treasurer, will be the designated collector of all dollars from District 6920. Please send all money collected by your club and designated for CART to: PDG Bruce Montgomery, 102 East 44th Street, Savannah, GA 31405.

CART AWARD

During the 2007-08 Rotary year, two awards will be given to those clubs contributing to CART. One will go to the club with the <u>largest total dollar amount</u> contributed to the CART Fund, while the other will go to the club with the <u>largest per capita dollar amount</u> to the CART Fund.

The Eugenia Phillips CART Fund Award will go to the club contributing the largest total dollar amount. This annual giving award is named after the mother of Augusta West Rotarian Bill Phillips.

For the club that contributes the largest per capita dollar amount to the CART Fund during the year, the Allen Gibson CART Fund Award will be presented. This award is named after the father of PDG Jeanette Caneega of The Rotary Club of Wrightsville.

Suggestions will be made throughout the year to help your club increase it's giving. Those suggestions will arive via email and USPS. A brochure currently being produced will also be available soon.

Wilkinson, a retired chartered accountant and founding partner of Wilkinson & Company, a public accounting firm, is the recipient of numerous Rotary honors. Among them are RI's Service Above Self Award and the Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service, Distinguished Service Award, and International Service Award for a Polio-Free World.

Wilkinson and his wife, Joan, have been married since 1953 and have four sons and eight grandchildren.



Rotarians Attend RI Convention

SALT LAKE CITY

Eleven members of Rotary District 6920 attended the 2007 RI Convention in Salt Lake City, Utah capping off a four-day celebration of the many faces of Rotary. DG Bill Blankenship of the RC of Camden County, along with Bob Ashley, RC of Savannah Sunrise,

Incoming RI President Wilfrid J. Wilkinson called membership the "single most important thing you can do to ensure Rotary's second century." PE Wilf sent RI convention-goers home with a directive to "found new clubs wherever the soil is fertile." Wilf added during the

closing plenary, "Without new members, nothing else matters. It will only take a few decades for Rotary to disappear."

The largest convention ever to be held in Salt Lake City, the event drew more than 16,500 Rotarians from 147 nations, some from as far

away as Katmandu, Nepal.

The first RI convention in Utah since 1919 was also the site of several other Rotary firsts. The Rotary Foundation's announcement of the first-ever 100% Major

Donor Club and the first Rotary World Peace Symposium, held just before the convention.

Following the convention, the RI Board of Directors announced a change in the location of the 2009 RI Convention from Seoul, South Korea to Birmingham, England. Specific dates are to be announced in the near future. The City of Los Angeles, California will host the 99th RI Convention to be held from June 15-18, 2008.

Smithsonian Institution's exhibit "Whatever Happened To Polio?" at Roosevelt Rehabilitation Center in Warm Springs this summer. In celebration of the exhibit's opening, the three Georgia Rotary Districts are teaming up to mark the occasion.

On Saturday, Aug. 11, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Rotarians from around the world will attend a ribbon cutting of the display on permanent loan from the Smithsonian National Museum of American History. Admission to the event, which will draw distinguished guests such as RI President Wilf Wilkinson and his wife Joan, Georgia Governor Sonny Perdue and Georgia Rotary district governors, is \$10; children under 6 are admitted free.

In addition to the ribbon cutting, numerous activities are being planned, including a golf tournament, a game room for older children, live entertainment, a project fair for Rotary clubs throughout the United States and much more. Bring your lawn chair for an old-fashioned picnic on the lawn.
