## **Centerville Rotarians Make Literacy Fun**

Today is International Literacy Day, in year five of what was proclaimed the Literacy Decade by the United Nations in 2003.

Spurred on by the awareness that there are 860 million illiterate people across the globe, including 100 million children who have no access to schools or education, Rotary International has asked each of its clubs to sponsor a community literacy program.

The Centerville Rotary Club accepted the challenge and was chosen last year as having the best literacy program out of the 65 clubs in District 6920.

In Houston County, with Centerville Rotary's help, literacy is dog-gone fun.

"We developed a program with Centerville Elementary School, a Title I school, to use in conjunction with its after school Mustang Academy," said Jack Steed, who is a member of the Centerville Rotary Club.

The program, called Paws for Reading, connects children who have difficulty reading with registered therapy dogs.

Paws for Reading is a first in the Houston County school system. Students earn the opportunity to read out loud to a therapy dog by having perfect attendance at the tutoring program the week before. The purpose, according to Steed, is to develop the child's reading skills in a nonthreatening environment. The dogs are nonjudgemental and offer the student an incentive to participate.

""The program has helped improve the students' ability to read aloud," explained Steed. "Being comfortable reading to the dogs has motivated the students to attend the Academy where they are also tutored in math. Confidence is built by their ability to read and to read aloud."

Amy St. Clair, a member of the Centerville Rotary Club and of Therapups, organized the program, meeting with school officials and soliciting volunteer Therapups members to participate.

Amy and her therapy dog, Nora, read with students on a weekly basis. Other Rotarians are involved with the school's Awards Day program, at which the club presents each participating student his or her own personal book "pawtographed" by a therapy dog. About 100 children participated last year.

"Recognition is key because some of these students may not have other recognizable academic achievements," Steed said.

The program was so successful that after the first week it was restructured to include a morning for therapy dogs to be available before school each morning in order to reach more students.

"The students just love reading to the dogs," said Jodi Clark, assistant principal at Centerville Elementary. "It is something they wanted to do because it is different and unique." Clark said the school used the program as an incentive, requiring attendance in the tutoring program.

"To read to the dogs, they had to attend the tutoring program and get that extra push from the teachers," she explained.

Along with Paws for Reading, the Centerville Rotary Club has a book for school libraries program. At its weekly morning meetings, each guest speaker is asked to write words of encouragement regarding reading and learning in a book purchased with club funds. The books are presented to the Centerville Elementary School, Eagle Springs Elementary School and Thomson Middle School.

The club has purchased more than 100 books for their libraries since its charter meeting in 2004.

"The Centerville Rotarians strongly encourage everyone to find ways, no matter how large or small, to help create a literate community, society and world," Steed said.

The number of registered therapy dogs limits the program. Anyone interested in getting their people-oriented dogs registered and participating in the program should contact the school at 953-0400.

### October is Vocational Service Month

Vocational Service is the Second Avenue of Service. No aspect of Rotary is more closely related to each member than a personal commitment to represent one's vocation or occupation to fellow Rotarians, and to exemplify the characteristics of high ethical standards and the dignity of work. Programs of vocational service are those that seek to improve business relations while improving the quality of trades, industry, commerce and the professions. Rotarians understand that each person makes a valuable contribution to a better society through daily activities in a business or profession.

Vocational Service is frequently demonstrated by offering young people career guidance, occupational information and assistance in making vocational choices. Some clubs sponsor high school career conferences. Many recognize the dignity of employment by honoring exemplary service of individuals working in their communities. The 4-Way Test and other ethical and laudable business philosophies are often promoted among young people entering the world of work. Vocational talks and discussion of business issues are also typical Vocational Service programs at most clubs.

Regardless of the ways in which Vocational Service is expressed, it is the banner by which Rotarians "recognize the worthiness of all useful occupations" and demonstrate a commitment to "high ethical standards in all businesses and professions."
