As a member of the Rotary family, you get a chance to focus on the heart of the organization and what makes it great - the more than 1.2 million members in nearly 33,000 clubs worldwide. But, why limit your focus on bringing in new members only during the month of August? Keep membership in mind all year by implementing at least one recruitment strategy each month.

Nothing, however, could be more important to prospective members than the level of energy they feel during a club visit. Prospective members need to see and feel your enthusiasm as well as your pride for your membership in Rotary. When club members are friendly, inviting, and inclusive, a potential Rotarian receives the most important message: You are welcome here and will have the opportunity to participate in something important.

Remember, the annual RI Membership Development and Extension Award is given to clubs within a district based on their achievements from July 1 to May 15 in the following categories: overall growth – the club with the highest growth rate (percentage); recruitment – the club with the most new members inducted; retention – the club with the highest retention rate (percentage); and new clubs – clubs that sponsored new clubs.

Magnolia Manor on St. Simons Island, Ga., recently donated 20 serviceable Echo hospital beds to Rotary Medical Transport Service (METS). The beds will be processed and shipped to a needy hospital facility overseas.

Myra Hocutt, Magnolia Manor administrator, made the donation possible. "It's through this kind of generosity that the METS program can continue," said Jim Bruce, president of the St. Simons Rotary Club, who coordinated the transport.

Assisting Ms. Hocutt, a St. Simons Rotary Club member, in making the donation possible were Alan Usher, Pooler Rotary Club, and Tom Miller, Savannah South Rotary Club. These clubs all work on the District 6920 METS Project.

METS is a volunteer service organization of the Rotary World Community Service Committees of all 65 clubs in District 6920. Rotarians involved collect, sort, identify, store and ship millions of dollars worth of still usable medical goods to worldwide locations sorely in need, Bruce said.

Helping load the truck were Magnolia Manor employees Gary Ratigan, Robert Duyn and Randy Collupy. "We appreciate the donation from Magnolia Manor, their administrator and their maintenance people in helping us complete this bed transfer," Bruce said.
