THE MEMBERSHIP MINUTE

PRESIDENTS-ELECT: MEMBERSHIP PLANNING

While the new Rotary year doesn't officially start until July 1, the presidents-elect should already be doing their membership planning. A review of membership goals submitted in the past shows ambitious intents by incoming presidents to increase club membership. But, simply saying that you are going to increase membership does not automatically make it happen.

Step one is to select a membership chairperson who recognizes that "Membership Chairperson" is not just a title. It is a responsibility. That person should sincerely want the job and all that it entails. The president-elect should realize that he/she is not just filling out an organization chart – they are making important assignments. It would be great if the selected chair has experience in recruitment and retention in their professional employment. The person should commit to attending the District Seminar and District Assembly where the topic of membership will be discussed in detail. They need to realize that unlike chairing an event, the responsibilities do not end until they are no longer the chair.

Each club's president-elect and the membership chair should review the membership plan that was submitted this past year and compare its stated goals with the results-to-date. A determination should be made as to whether the club membership is where it was projected to be. If the goals have been met, it may make sense to continue the same plan with possible minor tweaking. If the club has fallen short of its goal, a determination should be made as to whether the plan is lacking or if the follow through was not a high priority – or both.

It's not too soon to begin membership planning for 2011-2012. Each year, presidents-elect return from PETS with a great deal of motivation. They want their year as president of their Rotary club to be the best yet. A significant measure of their success when their year comes to a close will be their impact on membership.
