Bill Gates announces new US\$255 million grant for ending polio

Bill Gates announces a new US\$255 million grant for ending polio at the 2009 International Assembly in San Diego, California, USA. The **Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation** has awarded US\$255 million to Rotary International in the global effort to eradicate polio, bringing the total committed by Rotary and the Gates Foundation to \$555 million.

Shortly after meeting with incoming district governors from the four countries where the wild poliovirus is endemic -- Afghanistan, India, Nigeria, and Pakistan -- Bill Gates announced the new grant on Wednesday morning, January 21, 2009, at the International Assembly in San Diego, CA.

"Rotarians, government leaders, and health professionals have made a phenomenal commitment to get us to a point at which polio afflicts only a small number of the world's children," Gates said. "However, complete elimination of the poliovirus is difficult and will continue to be difficult for a number of years. Rotary in particular has inspired my own personal commitment to get deeply involved in achieving eradication."

"We are going to end polio now," affirmed Robert S. Scott, chair of RI's PolioPlus Committee.

In response to the new \$255 million Gates Foundation grant, Rotary will raise \$100 million in matching funds. In November 2007, RI received a \$100 million Gates Foundation grant, which Rotary committed to match by raising \$100 million.

The two Gates Foundation grants now total \$355 million. Rotary International's matching effort in response is called Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge, which must be completed by 30 June 2012.

The \$255 million grant is one of the largest challenge grants ever given by the Gates Foundation and the largest received by Rotary in its 104-year history. Rotary will spend the grant in direct support of immunization activities carried out by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, which is spearheaded by RI and its partners, the World Health Organization, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and UNICEF. Rotary will distribute the funds through WHO and UNICEF.

The participation of Rotary clubs and individual Rotarians in Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge remains crucial to its success. Rotary has raised nearly \$73 million toward this amount: \$62 million in contributions and \$11 million in commitments. Each club is being challenged to organize a public fundraiser annually for the next three years. In October, The Rotary Foundation Trustees approved special Paul Harris Fellow Recognition, which begins 1 July, featuring a certificate with the End Polio Now logo.

Polio eradication has been Rotary's top priority since 1985, with more than \$1.2 billion contributed to the effort. Gates praised Rotary for providing the volunteers, advocates, and donors who have helped bring about a 99 percent decline in the number of polio cases. "The world would not be where it is without Rotary, and it won't get where it needs to go without Rotary," he said.

The final hurdle still is ahead, said RI President-elect John Kenny. This grant shows that the Gates Foundation is just as committed as Rotary to ridding the world of this disease, he said. "We don't know exactly when the last child will be affected. But we *do* have the vaccines to wipe it out," he said. "Countries *do* have the will to deploy all the tools at their disposal. If we all have the fortitude to see this effort through to the end, then we *will* eradicate polio."



The Group Study Exchange team held their first training session January 10, and their excitement is building. In late April four District young professionals along with team leader John Neely will travel to the Amazon region of Brazil, to spend a month with area Rotarians exploring towns, rivers, the jungle and culture of a rapidly developing region of the world. They will visit the larger cities of Belem, at the mouth of the Amazon, Manaus, in the heart of the Amazon (complete with ornate 1910 opera house), and even Porto Velho, on the border with Bolivia. Travel will be by boat, small planes, and cars/buses on newly built dirt roads. Ecotourism in the Amazon is on the rise, so the team should come to understand the wealth of and threats to what some have called "the world's lungs."


Training sessions include Portuguese language taught by Brazilians, culture and customs of Brazil and working together to plan details of the trip. Team members will stay in the homes of local Rotarians, giving a rare inside look at the host county Brazil. They are planning a computer blog to allow Rotarians and family/friends to follow their adventures.





Rotary Club of Savannah Celebrates 95th Anniversary

The Beginning of Rotary International in Southern Georgia.

The Rotary Clubs of Southern Georgia began with the organization of the Rotary Club of Savannah (International Club No. 95) in January 1914. The club was organized by Savannahian John S. Banks, a piano shop owner. Mr. Banks did business with piano distributors in Atlanta, Georgia (Ben L. Crew, VP of the Rotary Club of Atlanta) and Birmingham, Alabama (John E. Shelby, VP of Rotary International). These men assisted Mr. Banks in his efforts in establishing the Rotary Club of Savannah

The Rotary Club of Savannah then organized the Rotary Club of Augusta in late 1914 and the Rotary Club of Brunswick in 1921. These two clubs and the Savannah club went on to organize several other area clubs (Statesboro, Claxton, Thomasville, etc.) in Southern Georgia, thus expanding Rotary throughout the area.

District Simplified Grants

The District Simplified Grants Committee reviewed club proposals and awarded a total of \$25,000 to the following club projects:

- RC of St. Simons Island Provide development to science initiative programs encompassing coastal and marine topics for grades K-5.
- RC of Eastman Provide books year round for new library and computers for technology center at Boys and Girls Club.
- RC of McRae Provide books for birth-5 year old youth with the Ferst Foundation for Childhood Literacy. Provide training materials for Youth Leadership Academy for high school students.
- RC of Hazlehurst Provide support for students who participate in community Special Olympics. During holiday season provide food and gifts for Special Olympic student.
- RC of August South Provide funds for distribution of dictionaries and Rotary coloring books to "at risk" students.
- RC of Savannah West Provide literacy program support for 100 homeless and low income children. Books will be provided for classrooms and for children to take home.
- RC of Valdosta Provide books for elementary school focusing on literacy improvements for underprivileged population.
- RC of Hawkinsville Provide funds for CPR/AED training and to purchase defibrillators for use in the high school and Recreation Department.
- RC of Camden & Kings Bay Provide school rulers to kindergarten age youth with "4 Way Test" printed one side and "Golden Rule" printed on opposite side.
- RC of Macon Provide funding to distribute dictionaries to every 5th grade student in Bibb County. The 4 Way Test will be attached inside the dictionary.
- RC of Savannah Sunrise Funding for nutritious foods to neighborhood centers during weekends and non-school periods. Arts and crafts materials provided during after-school periods.
- RC of Reidsville Provide early reading opportunities for 100 underprivileged children by use of Ferst Foundation for Childhood Literacy.
- RC of Warner Robins Distribute dictionaries to 3rd grade students in 27 public school and one private school. Over 2,000 dictionaries will be distributed by Rotarians.
- RC of Sandersville Provide materials to construct 4 wheelchair ramps at community center and residences. Team with Ferst Foundation to continue development of community literacy program.
- RC of Skidaway Island Provide computer equipment for an "off campus" Technology Center in low income housing area.
- RC of Centerville Provide nutritious food in local food subsidized program for low income families.
- RC of Pooler Provide funds to support literacy initiative (Reading Makes Cents) program. Books will be provided to elementary school media centers to promote student enthusiasm for reading.

Twenty Rotary clubs requested DSG funding in excess of \$52,300. Unfortunately, the District is allocated only \$25,000 for the year. Thanks to everyone for your interests, time and dedication to helping our home communities with special needs.



Rotary District 6920 Medical Equipment Transport Service, Inc. – METS

The first METS shipment occurred in October, 2003. On December 8, 2008, we at METS loaded our twenty-third 40-foot container. Our latest container should arrive at its destination at the Magsaysay Hospital in Tacloban, Philippines around January 12, 2009. The shipment consists of 16,388 lbs. of some of the finest equipment we have ever shipped, much of it new and unused. The supplies and equipment will be used in the only government hospital serving a population of nearly 2,000,000. The shipment was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Perry, GA.

To date METS has shipped over 311,000 lbs. of medical equipment and supplies, valued at approximately \$9 million to clinics and hospitals in eight developing nations, making healthcare available to an untold number of poor and needy people. All of this has been accomplished through the financial support of RI District 6920 Clubs and through hundreds of volunteer hours served by District 6920 Rotarians.

During its first five years of existence, METS has been an all-volunteer organization working to meet the ever-growing medical needs of the world's poor. In November, 2008, the METS Board of Directors voted unanimously to take METS to the next level of service by hiring a paid, full-time director sometime in 2009. Increased revenues will be required in order to accomplish this. To that end and led by our Chairman of the Board, Past DG Dick Hyer, we will begin to work to recruit support from clubs in surrounding RI Districts. METS will also host what we hope will become an annual fundraiser to supplement revenues, the details of which are in process.

The year 2009 promises to be an exciting year at METS. At a time when everyone is feeling the tensions of global economic uncertainty, the world's poor suffer the most. Through METS, District 6920 Rotarians are working for those who had nothing even before they lost it! The time is ripe for Rotarians to promote the cause of METS to your local healthcare providers (which also reduces land-fill product), to volunteer your time at the warehouse preparing for shipments and to join our fund-raiser team so that METS can expand our service to "reduce the pain and suffering of the world's poor".
