Augusta West Partners with Golden Harvest

Mike Fehrman, the Executive Director of The Golden Harvest Food Bank, began serving meals to Augusta's less fortunate over two decades ago out of a his van. Since then, Mike has grown the Food Bank's capacity to help those suffering from hunger, moving over 1 million pounds of food through its facility monthly. The Food Bank provides local pantries, within its 30-county territory spanning parts of Georgia and South Carolina, with these tons of food.

The Golden Harvest Food Bank also operates the Master's Table soup kitchen. It was started during the 1982 recession as one of the Food Bank's very first direct-service programs and, thanks to the kindness and support of the community, has grown to feed a noon meal to more than 300 homeless and hungry persons per day, 365 days per year.

On February 12th, 15 Augusta West Rotary Club members and their families spent the morning and early afternoon at the Master's Table serving hot plates of food to the Central Savannah River Area's less fortunate. This annual community project, chaired by Jenna Smalling, took place at the new \$1.8 million state of the art Master's Table building on Fenwick Street in downtown Augusta. This service project is one of the most popular the Augusta West Rotary Club undertakes. Volunteers see firsthand just how many people in the Central Savannah River Area lack basic needs, and the number of people coming to the Master's Table is greater than ever given these tough economic times.

Augusta West Rotary Club is already scheduled to help out in February 2012 and continue this project that increases the understanding of the need that exists in the CSRA, strengthens Rotary bonds and exemplifies Rotary's motto of "Service above Self."

Essay Contest Draws 40,600 Entries

The Georgia Laws of Life Essay Contest just completed its first year as a program of the new Georgia Rotary Districts Character Education Program (GRDCEP). As a character values competition for high school students, the contest attracted more than 40,600 essays and presented more than \$16,000 in student and teacher award money.

Rotary clubs became involved with the Georgia Laws of Life Essay contest in 2002, and since then more than 250,000 Laws of Life essays have been written by Georgia students. This year, as an official GRDCEP contest, the contest had 36 Rotary club sponsors from all three Georgia districts and 46 participating high schools.

The contest, which asks students to select a maxim of "Law of Life" and to discuss the character value in the maxim, recognizes students who exemplify values such as compassion, courage, perseverance, generosity, and integrity. One of the unavoidable reasons for a club to lose a valuable member is relocation. We are always sorry to see our dedicated friends leave, whether it's for a job transfer, retirement to a new community, relocation to care for an elderly parent or a myriad of other reasons.

While we are disappointed that each will no longer be a member of our club, there is no reason for their tenure with Rotary to end. Regardless of where they are going, there is bound to be another Rotary club close to their new home or work location. There are steps that we can and should take to help them continue their Rotary association in their new community.

To begin with, you can encourage them to remain Rotarians by providing them with the names and contact information for Rotary clubs at their destination. If they are staying within our district, the website at www.DaCdb.com is a good resource for finding that information. If they are relocating elsewhere, you can always do a web search to find local Rotary clubs for them.

Next, you might consider providing them with a letter of introduction that they can use as an "icebreaker" when they make contact with a Rotary club in their new location. You can endorse their candidacy for membership, highlighting their contributions to your club.

Finally, you can contact the District Governor, an Assistant Governor or District Membership Chair in their new community to request that they make arrangements to provide them with an invitation to attend one of the local clubs.

Relocation is often a dramatic event in people's lives. With so many changes taking place for them, seeking out a new Rotary club may not be at the top of their priority list right away. But, we can make it easier for them to meet new friends while they become an integral part of their new community by encouraging them to continue their Rotary membership and service.

Supporting the Annual Programs Fund in D-6920

Contributions to the Annual Programs Fund through the Every Rotarian, Every Year (EREY) initiative are the primary source of funding for the Foundation's humanitarian, educational, and cultural exchange programs worldwide. These programs are supported by thousands of Rotarians who volunteer their time and expertise.

Our clubs and Rotarians in District 6920 are having another good year in supporting The Rotary Foundation. Year-to-date contributions by clubs and Rotarians in District 6920 to the Foundation's Annual Programs Fund are \$221,203 resulting in \$62 per capita. The contributions typically sent in May and June to the Annual Programs Fund should achieve our District goal of \$320,170 for the 2010-11 Rotary year and hopefully will exceed this goal. The Rotary Foundation recognizes clubs that achieve 100% EREY (club achieves at least \$100 per capita with every active member contributing some amount to the Annual Programs Fund) and 100% Sustaining Member clubs (every member contributes at least \$100 to the Annual Programs Fund). The Foundation also recognizes the top three per capita clubs in the District.

District 6920 also recognizes the club that has the highest per capita average over the past three years with the presentation of the Blankenship Cup. This special recognition enters the third year of participation as a memorial to PDG Bill Blankenship.

Thank you for supporting the Annual Programs Fund providing Rotarians with the resources for Building Communities – Bridging Continents.
