Vets to Washington Project



The Vets to Washington Project mission is to ensure that every World War II veteran that is capable of making the trip is afforded the opportunity to visit Washington, D.C., and tour the WWII Memorial, built in honor of their service and sacrifice. It is funded through the generosity of small business owners, civic organizations and individuals who wish to honor veterans and their service to our country.

Assistant Governor Pam Lightsey has just returned from her fifth trip with the Vets to Washington Project, funded in part by District 6920 Rotary clubs and involving GRSP students. To date, more than 345 people have traveled with area Rotary clubs to the nation's capitol. Men and women of every branch of the military and the Merchant Marines have participated in past trips.

Funding for the veterans includes transportation and hotel accommodations for the veterans and a spouse or traveling companion. Lightsey says it's a three-day trip filled with lots of signing, information and food.

"After taking my first trip, I thought it would be important to have a GRSP student on the trip if room was available," she said. The first GRSP student to participate was Andres Madrid Malo of Columbia in September 2008. Since that time, four other GRSP students have participated.

There are currently two Rotary clubs that help sponsor a veteran and spouse/companion team for trips. Augusta South Rotary Club sponsors a couple for each trip, usually two per year. Martinez-Evans sponsors one couple per year.

"Augusta South paid for Andres' expenses when he attended," said Lightsey. 'It has been a great experience for our students who attend. They see and hear history that can't be taught in any textbook. Several students want to come back and take another trip. Each time they hear about another trip being planned, they express how the trip impacted them. I remember Andres' getting up in front of the bus and telling the veterans 'thank you for fighting not only for Americans,' but for his country, too."

GRSP Student Expresses Gratitude After Vets to Washington Trip

In April of this year, then-GRSP Student Agnes Boll was able to participate in a Vets to Washington Project trip. Upon her return, Agnes wrote a letter that speaks volumes of why such trips are important and significant for today's young people.

"Every year on the 4th of May all of Denmark will illuminate their windows with live candles after night has fallen. We do this in celebration of the message we received from BBC over the radio 64 years ago. The Germans departed their occupation and after five years of darkness, Denmark was a free country again.

"Maybe 8-10 years ago, when I was getting older, I wanted to know more and asked questions. My grandma started telling me how clearly she remembers the roaring sound of the German airplanes that day in April when they flew in across our country.

"She told me of the Danish Freedom Fighters, who fought for Denmark's freedom by illegally sabotaging railroads and transport ways the Germans used to transport goods to Norway. And finally she told of the day the message came that Denmark was free and the Allied Forces was winning the war.

"She told me of how the Danes tore down their darkening curtains and started bonfires in the streets and she told me of how she especially remembers the soldiers driving and marching in, handing out gum and candy to the children, telling them the times of war were over.

"And now, I am here, a girl from Denmark, in the company of soldiers who fought not only for themselves, their families and their country, but for the countries of the world, for my family and for

world, for my
family and for me.

"Walking around the memorials,
especially the WWII, I realized that for a
long time I've only known half of the story
- my grandma's.

"Now, I feel like I know so much more - still not close to everything, but I've got a better understanding of the history of that time.

"I feel blessed to have been able to go on this trip, to get to talk with so many different, wonderful people, the Veterans.

PAWS FOR READING

A Unique Literacy Program

This program adopted by The Rotary Club of Centerville connects children with reading difficulties with registered therapy dogs. The program in progress with Centerville Elementary, a Title I school, is an after-school activity and allows students to win the opportunity to read to a therapy dog by having perfect attendance the previous week. Paws For Reading lasts for six weeks and is the first of its kind in the Houston School System.

Students work one-on-one reading aloud to a therapy dog. The purpose is to develop the child's reading skills in a non-threatening environment. The dogs are non-judgemental and offer the student an incentive to participate.

Amy St. Clair, a member of The Rotary Club of Centerville, is also a member of Therapup. She organized the program by meeting with school officials and soliciting volunteer Therapup members to participate. Amy and her therapy dog, Nora, read with the students on a weekly basis. Other Rotarians have been involved with the school's Awards Day Program when Centerville has presented participating students with their own personal book "pawtographed" by a therapy dog. Recognition is key because some of these students may not have other recognizable academic achievements.

The program has helped improve the student's ability to read aloud. Being comfortable reading to the dogs builds the student's confidence in reading skills. The program has been so successful that after the first week, it was restructured to also include a morning session before school in order to reach more students. The number of trained therapy dogs is the principal factor limiting the size of the program.
