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Space Man Sees Flashing Lights; Says It's Humans Using Technology to Stay in Touch

Ladies and Gentlemen, tonight we are flying over area 6920 and as you look down you will see clusters of light along the I-75 and I-95 corridors. Multiple Resources Enable Rotarians to Stay Connected Despite Distance

With a district the size of 6920, staying connected can often be difficult. But, thanks to many outlets and the advancement of technology, Rotarians throughout District 6920 can do so with minimal effort.

Among the ways Rotarians are staying connected are through the District website, the District Facebook page, DaCdb, webinars and the new speaker database.

During the past three months there have been almost 2,100 visits to the Rotary District 6920 website - www.Rotary6920.org. A total of 963 people have viewed content on the site and just over 40 percent of those visits have been from people who had never visited the website before.

There have been a number of visits from people within the southern region of the country, but there have also been several visits from California, Michigan and New York. The most visits to the site, however, have come from within the state.

Those visits from within the state came primarily from Savannah, with Macon, Augusta, Brunswick, McRae, Warner Robins, Valdosta, Milledgeville, Kingsland and Evans rounding out the top 10.

With the creation of a district Facebook page - www.facebook.com/Rotary6920 - the ability to share photos, publicize fundraising events and share success stories has become even easier. That's what the nearly 200 district Facebook fanpage members have discovered in the past six months.

What this data tells district leaders is that technology is making it easier for those within the district, and beyond, to stay connected despite the miles that separate them.

Clubs Urged to Take Advantage of Speaker Database

Assistant Governor Ben Harvill of Eastman is in the process of establishing a Speakers Bureau Database which will allow clubs within the district to add to a list of speakers available for club meetings

Rural clubs struggle to find quality programs on a consistent basis. I discussed this issue with DG Gordon and decided to develop a web-based tool for all the clubs to utilize for weekly programs.

The goals are to:

- * Provide Club Presidents with a tool to identify weekly speaker information
- * Obtain written permission to publish photographs of the speaker in newspapers, social media, video feeds, Facebook, etc.
- * Determine if the speaker would be willing to present the program at other Rotary clubs throughout our district
- * Develop a web-based system for all District 6920 members to access via the District website to locate weekly programs

A one-page Speakers Information/Release of Information sheet will be used at each weekly meeting. If the Speaker would like to present the program to other clubs, then the speaker indicates what regions of our District they are willing to travel.

That information can then be entered online by the local club so that all clubs will have access to the speaker's contact information and program topic. Then District members can contact the speaker directly to set up a program.

The database also includes speaker's notes, speaker introduction and photographs/presentations, etc.

All the details and instructions will be fully explained to incoming Club Presidents at PETS in March.

Facebook Offers Yet Another Way for Rotarians to Share Information

Rotary District 6920's Facebook offers you another Rotary tool to share the good deeds and events of your club with Rotarians in 6920, but how do you use it?

Our Facebook page - www.facebook.com/rotary 6920 - is one more avenue for us to communicate with members and potential members. It should not replace your newsletter, your website or other methods you are using to communicate with members.

The Rotary 6920 Facebook Page is intended to keep Rotarians informed of events, news, happenings and activities happening at the club, district and international levels.

Anyone who can access the Internet can access the district's Facebook page. Thus, it is a very public page. That said, only people who have a Facebook account can post comments or "like" the Rotary page. And only people who have a Facebook account and who are designated as administrators of the page can post videos, make status changes, upload photos and announce upcoming events.



Each club has the option of selecting up to two people to be their Facebook representative(s). In addition, district leaders are also administrators for this page. Anne Cordeiro - annem.cordeiro@yahoo.com - is the person to contact if you need to be made an administrator.

Here's how to put the Facebook page to use for your club

View the Rotary District 6920 Facebook page by going to www.facebook.com/rotary6920. You can get regular updates on your Facebook page from the District 6920 page by "liking" the page. Any comments that are posted should always pass Rotary's 4-way test.

You can post news about your club, but will need to be an administrator of the page. To get your administrator status turned on, sign onto Facebook. In the upper right hand corner, you will be asked for your user id and your password. If you do not have a Facebook account, you will need to set one up. Click on the "sign up now" section and follow the steps. Once you have your personal Facebook page, go to www.facebook.com/Rotary6920 and select "like".

Send a message to Anne Cordeiro via email AnneM.Cordeiro@Yahoo.com or via Facebook telling her you are your club's designee. She will turn on your administrator status, and you should get a note from Facebook saying you have been made an administrator.

As an administrator, along with being able to post comments, as all who have a Facebook account can do, you can post news, photos, links, videos, photos, questions.

There are a few things you need to keep in mind when using the 6920 Facebook page:

- * If you have a comment for everyone, use the comment section or status section.
- * If you want to send a message to a specific person that has made a comment, click on the person's name in the comment and his/her Facebook page will come up. If it doesn't, they may have disabled this feature. On the upper right of their page, you will see "send a message". Click here and type away. The message you send will be a conversation between you and the selected person.
- * Please exercise care with photos. If you choose to take the step of tagging people or writing cutlines, please consider the 4-way test. Also, please treat photos of children with the utmost diligence. Please make sure you have the needed permission(s) from a child's parent/guardian and that the parent/guardian is comfortable with their child's photo being posted on Facebook. One option may be to post the photo without identifying the child or to post the photo with only the child's first name.
- *Please keep this page strictly about Rotary. Anything that looks like an ad promoting anything other than Rotary will be removed.

Rotarians Have Reason to Celebrate

Rotarians have significant reasons to celebrate Rotary's 107th anniversary.

Major gains have been made in the fight to eradicate polio, Rotary's top priority. In January, India reached a historic milestone by marking a full year without recording a new case of polio. The country has been an epicenter of the crippling childhood disease.

Worldwide, fewer than 650 polio cases were confirmed for 2011, less than half the 1,352 infections reported in 2010. Overall, the annual number of polio cases has plummeted by more than 99 percent since the initiative was launched in 1988, when polio infected about 350,000 children a year. More than 2 billion children have been immunized in 122 countries, preventing 5 million cases of paralysis and 250,000 deaths.

Also in January, Rotary leaders announced that Rotary clubs raised more than \$200 million in response to a \$355 million challenge grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. In recognition of Rotary's commitment, the Gates Foundation contributed an additional \$50 million. All of the resulting \$605 million will be spent in support of immunization activities in polio-affected countries.

"We'll celebrate this milestone, but it doesn't mean that we'll stop raising money or spreading the word about polio eradication," Rotary Foundation Trustee John F. Germ told Rotary leaders at the International Assembly in San Diego. "We can't stop until our entire world is certified as polio-free."
