Are You a Rotary Membership Booster?

Centerville Rotary Past President and recent "Hero Among Us" recipient Jack Steed has agreed to serve as this year's District Membership Chair. Membership is not a new subject for Jack. Let's be straightforward about Rotary Membership. Ask yourself, "Do I believe that new members and the retention of established members is crucial to the survival of Rotary?" "Have I made gaining new members one of my goals?" "Do I take advantage of opportunities to invite prospective new members to a club meeting?" If you can't give a positive answer to those questions, then consider you to be a Rotary Membership Booster.

For the most part, new members don't just happen. If you don't have a good Public Relations program, if people don't know about your club, if people don't know about your club's accomplishments, if you don't "toot your club's horn", if you don't realize that membership is the responsibility of all club members and not just the Membership Committee and talk about growing your club's membership is no more than just talk, and it is most likely that your membership accessions are stagnant.

In order for Rotary to survive, it must acquire as many new members as possible and especially those in the 25 to 35 year old range. If you are asking yourself, "How can I become a Rotary Membership Booster?" Here are a few suggestions as to how you can do so: (1) Obtain a membership list from your chamber of commerce or other community active organiza-

tions. (2) Carefully review the lists and identify those whom you believe would be good Rotarians and invite them to a club meeting. (3) Be sure you tell them what Rotary is about and give them the small folding card captioned: What is Rotary?

Rotary is the most international of all service organizations and it is not the Rotary you may remember during your youth The format of most clubs ensures "good energy" and most are amenable to innovative approaches. The current generation of prospective Rotarians

is not interested in "old boy" clubs where the membership usually consists of a mindset that does not entertain new initiatives. Rotarians should build for their clubs a feeling of oneness, of dependence upon one another and of strength to be derived by unity. This must exist if your club is to have or achieve a robust new membership program and it must exist if your club expects to retain established members.

Are you a Rotary Membership Booster? We hope your answer is a resounding "Yes".
