# Council on Legislation

Rotary International maintains and develops the rules and regulations of the organization through The Council of Legislation which meets one time every three years. The next meeting is on April 21-26 of this year -2013. One representative from each of the 532 districts in Rotary International make up the Council which will meet in Chicago, Illinois.

The Council may make Resolutions for the RI Board to consider or it may pass Enactments which are more binding pieces of legislation for the RI Board to process. More than 300 proposals from 214 districts have been made for this year's Council. Many proposals overlap so there may be combining of resolutions to make the process more efficient.

The proposed enactment legislation might be grouped into the following categories: Club Administration, Attendance, Club Meetings, Membership, Districts, Object of Rotary, The Rotary Foundation, Officers and Elections, Rotary International, RI Finances and Dues, RI Meetings and Legislative Procedures.

One of the most frequently discussed proposals over the years has been a proposal to relax the attendance rules of Rotary. Another frequent proposal has been to modify the requirements for the classification of members. One proposal this year calls for clubs to be able to have flexibility in setting the number of meetings per month which they will hold.

I look forward to serving as the representative of District 6920 and reporting back to the District. As I understand, it is an intense week of work, but also it is very rewarding.

### Membership Retention Not Complicated

One of the most critical reasons we do not retain some members is the fact that the quality of our club meetings, service activities and social events are just not worth the time of some busy people. Club meetings must be interesting, enjoyable, fun, worthwhile and even educational if we expect to retain the interests of busy members. A club that settles for dull, uninteresting and poorly organized meetings will be a club with real retention problems. Rotarians should look forward to attending an interesting weekly meeting, or they may soon find themselves passing up their Rotary meeting to accept other endeavors or pursue other interests.

A significant retention step is to assist a member to join another Rotary Club even if he or she is leaving your club due to changing businesses or moving to another location. When a good Rotarian moves away, we have a responsibility to advise the club in the other community that a Rotarian has moved to their locale. We may lose a member in our club, but we can retain him or her in Rotary by suggesting their name to another club.

Finally, we must be alert to symptoms, which lead to resignation. Frequently, missed attendance, failure to participate in social events, lack of interest in service projects, or club fund raisers, apparent family or business problems; these may all be signals that a member may soon resign. Here is where club leaders can have a kind personal discussion and may save the prospective dropout. Just a telephone call or even a note to say, "We miss you," may be one step in retaining a member whose interest level is teetering. Occasionally, a thoughtful conversation may provide an answer to a potential retention problem. That is the real spirit of the Rotary Family.

# **Dictionaries: A Popular Literacy Project**
