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Rotary District 6920 Announces Group Study Exchange Trip to Turkey

This year our Group Study Exchange is with the incredibly historic area in Turkey included in District 2440 in western Turkey along the Aegean Sea, which includes Ephesus. In addition, the team will conclude their trip with several days in Istanbul, the city identified as the world's most livable city by the readers of the Financial Times of London. Applications are now being accepted and should be completed and delivered to our GSE Chair by **November 15, 2011**.

The team is tentatively scheduled to depart for Turkey on May 2, 2012 and return on June 1st. The Rotary Foundation provides each team member with a round-trip air ticket, and local Rotarians in Turkey provide meals, lodging and travel within their district so the cost of the trip for team members is minimal. Patrick Roche, member of the Rotary Club of Macon will lead prepare and lead our team of four non-Rotarians under the age of 40. Patrick is an MD on the faculty of Mercer Medical School.

Turkey is the land bridge connecting Europe and Asia. As such, it has an historic past. This is where Achilles battled the Trojans in Homer's Iliad. It is where tradition says that Alexander the Great cut the Gordian knot. It is the site of Ephesus, capital of

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the Roman province of Asia and the site of early Christian churches visited by the Apostle Paul. It is the former Ottoman Empire.

Turkey is also of strategic importance today. It is a country where 98% of the people are Muslim. Yet it is also seeks to be a secular state. It is a member of NATO and is a candidate for admission to the European Union.

Rotary District 2440, which will host our team, lies along the Aegean Sea. It includes some of Turkey's most historic sites. In addition, our team will conclude their trip with several days in Istanbul, in District 2420.

GSE TEAM LEADER PATRICK ROCHE

Patrick Roche, member of the Rotary Club of Macon, will prepare and lead our team. Patrick is a medical doctor, who teaches and practices at the Mercer University School of



Medicine. He is a founding physician of the Macon Volunteer Clinic and volunteers his time at the Clinic. He chose to spend 6 months of his sabbatical time off from Mercer living and working at the Hospital Albert Schweitzer in Deschapelles, Haiti. During that time he identified and helped the Macon Rotary Club complete an

international project at an orphans' home there.

Patrick is married to Kathy and they have three children, who are young adults.

Patrick has led young men and women on medical missions, and he is excited to lead our GSE team. He believes that meeting people face-to-face and getting to know them and appreciate their culture, history, and religion helps bring us closer to world peace and understanding.

Participants from 6920 in prior exchanges have included a veterinarian, a nonprofit director, a VP at United Way, college and middle school teachers, a media expert, an attorney, a hospital government affairs person, a judge, a librarian, a minister, a city/county government manager, a public radio reporter, an IT specialist, a hospital government affairs expert, an artist, and many others.

Those who have had the exceptional opportunity to be a GSE team member tell us that the opportunity to live in another culture as the guest of Rotarians is gift of insight and perspective of life-long benefit.

ROTARIANS' ROLE OF IDENTIFYING APPLICANTS

Rotarians should be aware that the cultural exchange involving sending our team and hosting the visiting team will continue next year but will be replaced with an entirely different format under Future Vision in 2013-14. So this year and next are the **last opportunities to provide this experience for younger professionals** who would represent 6920 well in to the host district.

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As your District Governor I now have had the honor of being hosted by 36 clubs in our district and have met with six more clubs using Skype – on the way to visiting all 65 of our clubs in person. As I learn from my DG

contemporaries in other districts that they are almost done with their visits I am reminded how distances within 6920 influence our ability to meet face to face.

In between trips I have been a participant in two different webinars, one conducted by RI and another conducted by our Zone 34 and then I get a new perspective of distances – that they don't really matter so much when we get the benefit of hearing from experts who may be thousands of miles away or even around the world somewhere.

On one webinar on E-clubs, I listened to a Rotarian member of an E-club formed by Rotarians who constantly travel and from another Rotarian who participates in an Eclub that covers geography divided into islands and places difficult to reach. On my first webinar I listened to our new

On October 6th, 6920 took its first webinar step with a gathering of Assistant Governors over the Internet. While we have a few wrinkles to work out, we can easily see the potential benefit to club presidents or committee chairs when they can interact with their peers and with subject-matter experts while in front of their computer at home or at their office.

We will, of course, continue to hold our annual face-to-face training sessions for Presidents Elect and for club officers and leaders to talk about membership and our foundation, but hopefully you will join with others as we

experiment this year to explore how webinars can be utilized to connect Tifton to Augusta and from Macon to St. Mary's as we reach deeper into our clubs with information with no travel time involved, except for the movement of a few pulses over some fiber optic lines. Stay tuned...

"The three Valdosta clubs were the first three clubs to participate in a Skype visit from the District Governor. Bob Harrison and myself were a little nervous about the whole idea. But with the help of Amos Terrell at Wiregrass Technical College it happened. Bob and I think this was a great new tool for all clubs. We were able to have all three presidents to tell the District Governor the plans for their clubs and for Gordon to tell each president the things he would like the clubs to do for the district. I think future DG's could have each assistant governor have all of their presidents meet at one location and use Skype like we did to meet with the DG. All of these meetings could be done in the month of July. This would help the DG know what each club is doing early on. It also lets each club know what the DG's plans are for the district. These meetings will help the DG to have a more flexible visit schedule. I'm not saying that we need to use all of the technology that's available, but I think the webinars and Skype are very good tools that we can use now. It can get all of our clubs up to speed at the beginning of their year."

Valdosta Club Accepts Check for Ferst Foundation

Rotary Club of Valdosta Past President Dr. Dennis Marks, also the club's literacy chair, recently accepted a \$1,000 donation to the program from Colquitt EMC.

The Valdosta area Rotary Clubs are working with the Ferst Foundation for Childhood Literacy to provide Dolly Parton's Imagination Library books each month to children under the age of 5 in Lowndes County. The clubs believe early reading is important to all parts of the community because it leads to a lifetime of opportunity. Children who learn to read early in life become avid learners in school, skillful workers on the job and informed citizens in the community. With Colquitt EMC's support, they are one step closer to every child in Lowndes County entering school prepared to learn. The contribution will provide an Imagination Library book each month for a year for 28 children under the age of 5.

District's Second Matching Grant Gets Approval

A report from District Matching Grants Chair John Neely

We just received from RI official notice of approval of our District's 2nd Matching Grant---\$44,444 for the purchase of cataract and general eye surgery equipment for a charity health clinic in rural India, near Calcutta. Funding includes \$18,472 in D6920 DDF, \$20,972 in Foundation matching grants, and the balance provided by the RC of Dakshin Barasat, which will oversee the project. Our first project was for water well parts and maintenance in the Chiquitano region of eastern Bolivia.

The Rotary Foundation matches DDF funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis, and cash provided by host or international club Rotarians fifty cents on the dollar. DDF funds are returned to each Rotary District from TRF based on past District Foundation giving. Funds are held by RI for three years, then are returned to the District, to be used for international humanitarian grant projects, District Simplified Grants (DSG), Ambassadorial Scholarships and Polio Plus. After our first two matching grant DDF allocations, and funding our Ambassadorial Scholar and monies set aside for DSGs, D6920 still has approximately \$151,355 for potential humanitarian projects around the world. DDF funds, which when matched by TRF, could become over \$300,000--that can do a lot of good in the world!. So we are still actively soliciting projects sponsored by District Clubs.

We do have several projects in the works, in various stages of readiness for submission to RI:

Haiti - Skidaway Club; native language training materials for schools in Matenwa, Haiti, building on past successful MGs

Haiti - Richmond Hill Club; supply clean water filtration systems for special needs orphanage and elder care facility in Bonneau, Haiti

Brazil - Rotary East Club; equipment and teaching materials to rural school in Ilheus; one other being considered

India-Marshes of Glenn (?) RC, St. Simons; supply equipment and teaching materials for women's health clinic in Mysore, southern India

Sri Lanka - Dublin club (?); materials for special needs school

Bolivia - Rotary East Club; 2nd grant to expand water well project; other projects being formulated. Anyone else have leads on possible matching grant projects?
