The bragging part that is in the numbers is worth telling. There are 538 districts worldwide and more than 70% of the districts applied. That is 377. Now the topping, District 6920 was the ONLY district of the 377 (or you could say in the world!) to be fully funded with the grant, meaning we are receiving the full \$15,000. That is good news worth telling.

You should begin to see and hear evidence of the grant in the next few weeks. More news later.



Scholarship to Study in Oslo, Norway Available to One Student in District 6920

The Norwegian Rotary Advisory Board is once again inviting three (3) young Georgia students to study in Norway next summer. We ask that your club select a candidate(s) for this award. The final selection will be made by a committee of Trustees in each District.

Scholarship information: Visit the Oslo Summer School Website, www.uio.no/summerschool, for details. *DO NOT SUBMIT APPLICATION THROUGH THAT WEBSITE. APPLY THROUGH GRSP AND IF YOU ARE SELECTED YOU WILL THEN APPLY TO THE SUMMER SCHOOL*.

- (a) Dates: June 21 August 1, 2014 at the University of Oslo.
- (b) English is the language of the Summer School.
- (c) **REQUIREMENTS**:
- 1. Ages 20-24 Singles only
- 2. Must have completed college sophomore year
- 3. Three color photographs passport size taken within last six months
- 4. Seriousness of purpose
- 5. Personal qualities likely to make a good representative of our Country abroad
- 6. Excellent health

The program includes air fares Atlanta-Oslo and return to Atlanta, a field tour to Bergen (administered by the University of Oslo), room, board and tuition at the International Summer School at the University of Oslo and visiting for one week with Norwegian Rotary host families. The recipients of the scholarships must pay their travel expense to and from Atlanta, plus provide their own personal spending money.

GENERAL COURSES: Norwegian Art, Norwegian Language, History, Folklore and Literature of Norway and Scandinavia, Economics, Politics, Culture and Society, International Relations and Development Studies

GRADUATE COURSES: Educational System of Norway, Physical Education in Norway, Medical Care and Health Services in Norway, Peace Research, Energy Planning and the Environment, Special Education, Kulturlivet i samtidesn Norge, Norwegian Petroleum Law and Transboundary Pollution.

The University of Oslo will issue a Certificate of Achievement to all who satisfactorily complete the Summer School courses. Credits may also be certified.

PURPOSE: While the immediate goal of this International School is to impart knowledge about some aspects of Norway, it also seeks to increase understanding and good will among nations through daily living together.

HOUSING: Lecture and Seminar activities and housing will be at the University located at Blindern, ten minutes by electric car from the center of Oslo. Men and women students will be housed at the Blindern Dormitories. Meals will be provided at the University Center Cafeteria.

Meningococcal Meningitis

What is meningococcal meningitis?

Meningococcal disease, which includes meningitis, is a serious bacterial infection that strikes between 1000 to 2600 Americans each year. Although rare, meningococcal disease can cause meningitis (swelling of the brain or spinal cord) or meningococcemia (blood infection). Vaccination has been available for decades and is a safe and effective way to help protect against this potentially devastating disease.

Preteens and teens are at greater risk for getting meningococcal meningitis and are more likely to die compared with other age groups. Death rates from meningococcal meningitis are up to 5 times higher in teenagers and young adults (15 through 24 years of age) compared with other age groups.

How do you get meningococcal meningitis?

Meningococcal bacteria are spread from person to person through close contact. Common everyday activities (e.g., sharing drinking glasses, eating utensils, kissing, or living in close quarters) can put even healthy preteens and teens at greater risk for getting meningitis. That's why vaccination is so important.

What are symptoms of meningococcal meningitis?

Meningococcal meningitis can be hard to recognize, especially in its early stages, because symptoms are similar to those of more common viral illnesses. But unlike more common illnesses, the disease can progress quickly and may cause death within 24 hours. Symptoms may include high fever, severe headache, stiff neck, confusion, vomiting, exhaustion, and/or a rash.

What can happen if you get meningococcal meningitis?

Although rare, meningococcal meningitis is serious and can potentially cause death of an otherwise healthy young person within 24 hours. About 10 percent of people who get meningococcal meningitis will die. Up to 1 in 5 survivors are left with serious medical problems, including:

• Amputation of arms, legs, fingers, and toes • Brain damage?• Deafness?• Kidney damage

How can you help prevent your child from developing meningococcal meningitis?

Vaccination is safe and effective and the best way to help protect preteens and teens from meningococcal meningitis. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and other leading medical groups recommend meningococcal vaccine for:

• Preteens and teens 11 through 18 years of age • College freshmen living in dormitories?

• Children 2 through 10 years of age who are at increased risk or if elected by their health-care providers and parents Vaccination is available for people 2 through 55 years of age who wish to reduce their risk for contracting the disease.

District Looking for Global Grants Projects

Having been quite active over the past two year doing humanitarian projects around the world through the matching grant program, D6920 Rotarians are encouraged to search out international partner clubs in sponsoring a new Global Grant. Why? Two reasons: "Doing Good in the World" is an integral part of being a Rotarian, and secondly, as of September, 2013, there still are District Designated Funds left for projects this year.

As most of us know by now, eligible projects must serve to improve lives within the six "Areas of Focus," such as disease prevention & treatment, water & sanitation, or education & literacy. Other selection criteria include 1) projects must be over \$30,000 total, including all funding sources, 2) projects must be sustainable over at least 3-5 years, with provisions, for instance, for maintenance of equipment and education/training on its use, and 3) projects must have measurable results. The Foundation will still match international and US club cash contributions fifty cents on the dollar, and DDF allocated by the District will be matched dollar for dollar.

And as we learned at the Augusta District Conference, Clubs must be "qualified" to receive grant funds, by signing a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), and participating in the annual District grants training seminar. A new aspect of the new Global Grant program this year is that Districts can send teams of Rotarians and non-Rotarians to another country as part of a Vocational Training Team (VTT) to provide hands on assistance identifying good projects and making them happen.
