GRSP an Adventure in International Service

The GRSP story is one of vibrant, living and compelling desire to further the Rotary ideal of international service through the bonds of friendship and understanding; a story of a small group of men, Georgia Rotarians, dedicated to a humanitarian ideal, which led an entire state into an adventure of international service. It is a story that Georgia Rotarians believe should be told, not in the spirit of boastful pride, but as offering an example of international service which has not only encompassed the world, but in return, has given Georgia Rotarians the deep satisfaction achieved through an unselfish application of service above self.

It was in 1946 that the world began to see, for the first time in many years, the light of peace and yet, at the same time, it saw desolation — ruin — despair in too many war-torn countries throughout the world. In this same light, a Georgia Rotarian, William A. Watt of Thomasville, saw the need for a practical application of the Rotary ideal of international service; one which must look to the future of world peace and at the same time one which could give courage to those living in despair of the present. It was only logical that this application of international service be centered around the youth of the world, in

whose hands would rest the future of world peace.

So was born Will Watt's idea. As a past District Governor of Rotary, he advanced this idea to the Rotarians of former District 165 which at that time included the entire State of Georgia. The 1945-46 District Governor, Irwin Ingram, strongly supported the proposal. Thus in the Fall of 1946, three young men and one young woman from European countries, became the first Rotary sponsored students to attend schools in Georgia. A small committee with Past District Governor Theodore T. Molnar as its head, administered the program and began a project that later became the Georgia Rotary Student Program organization.

Through the years, the interest of Georgia Rotarians in this program grew in intensity; the per capita contribution by Rotarians and the special club donations increased, permitting a steady increase in the number of scholarships granted. The State University System, as well as privately operated institutions, early recognized the value of the program, and by waiving out-of-state registration fees, materially aided in the reduction of the cost of scholarships. In the years since the inception of the program, over 2,700 young men and women, from more than 78 countries, have been brought to the campuses of Georgia by its Rotarians.

They are one of the clubs in 6920 that are exempt from being required to operate under the current guidelines of Rotary International. The Savannah Metro is one of our Districts' fastest growing clubs. They have a couple of conventional meetings a month at different locations. The other meetings may be service meetings, social meetings or fundraisers. Their average age is the youngest of any club in our District. Savannah Metro and Kings Bay are our only clubs that currently meet in the evening.

The Rotary clubs of Camden County and Kings Bay hosted an intercostal waterway dinner cruise while we were in their area. It was a great opportunity for those clubs to enjoy each others' company and have several prospective members join them. This was a lot of fun!



Group Study Exchange Team

Team Leaves for Month-Long Stay in Bolivia in Spring 2013

This year's Group Study Exchange is with Rotary D4690 in Bolivia, and we're looking for team members who hablan un poco de espanol. We need one Rotarian team leader and 4 young professionals to represent our District for perhaps four weeks of travel through one of the most interesting and diverse countries in the Americas. Tentatively, our team will be leaving Savannah in early May, 2013, and a team of Bolivianos will come to our District about the same time.

The Rotarian team leader, and non-Rotarian team members, should ideally be fluent or at least "comfortable" in the Spanish language (there will be language training before leaving), be open minded to diverse people and cultures, and healthy enough to maintain the typically rigorous GSE schedule as setup by our Bolivian hosts. The team leader should have some international travel experience and work well with young people.

The GSE team leader will coordinate the recruitment and selection of our GSE team members in November/December, and then lead the training of the team between late January and April 2013. This will consist of five or six meetings, usually on Saturdays. *The DEADLINE for submission of team leader applications to GSE Chair Justin Godchaux is October 15, 2012.*

Group Study Exchange is a rare opportunity to be hosted by Rotarians and immersed in another culture. Team members typically stay in Rotarians' homes, and most expenses, including travel, are paid by Rotary International. GSE candidate team members living within D6920 are usually identified and recruited by Rotarians. D6920 Rotarians are asked to recruit young professionals between 25 and 40 to serve on the GSE team. These four team members cannot be Rotarians or related to Rotarians. *The DEADLINE for GSE team member applications is November 30, 2012.*

The team from Bolivia will arrive in our District mid-April 2013 and will attend our District Conference in Augusta May 3-5, 2013.
