This year, RI President Gary Huang is urging all Rotarians to Light Up Rotary by participating in a Rotary Day. The Rotary Day concept is a simple one: hold a fun, informal event in your community for the non-Rotary public and use it as an opportunity to introduce them to Rotary. There are many possibilities: hold an outdoor picnic or barbecue, host a sporting event or concert, organize a family fun run, align the event with a public parade or festival, a catered event, and invite inspirational speakers to attend. Showcase the positive impact of Rotarians working to improve our communities such as having a display of newspaper articles and pictures of your club members working on a project or fundraiser for the community.

Avoid using Rotary jargon or referring to internal traditions; present Rotary as an enticing opportunity for prospective members to make new friends, exchange ideas, and take action to improve their local community and the world. Consider including a hands-on service project as part of the event to give visitors the chance to see first-hand how Rotary benefits the community.

I have designated Saturday, August 16, 2014 as our "official" Rotary Day throughout the district; however, choose any day that your club wants to participate in a Rotary Day; but, I encourage you to have a Rotary Day as soon as you can. 

On July 3, a group of Rotarians and their families worked hard in

the summer heat to celebrate the ground breaking of the new ADA compliant (handicapped accessible) 600' path at De Vaul Henderson Park and to help clear land for the construction of the Bryan County Bark Park.

The Rotary Club of Richmond Hill was able to secure a

district grant of \$2,500 to help build this path in conjunction with the Bryan County Bark Park which will provide much needed handicap and stroller access to the soft ball fields, urban trail system and the upcoming dog park. This important addition is a requirement by Bryan County and has added \$20,000 to the fundraising targets of the Bryan County Bark Park. The Rotary grant was used to fund drainage and land preparation for a universally accessible path.

The men and women of the Rotary Club of Augusta West, provided more than 310 hours in the classrooms at the school during the 2013-2014 school year. Surpassing those numbers will be the goal when classes resume in August.

Principal Elizabeth Schad, at a "Welcome Back!" breakfast in the cafeteria in August. Soon after, club members meet their new students, providing help as agreed with the teacher. Services vary from working with selected students, participating in classroom action, special readings, discussions, whatever is aimed at building self confidence and increasing skills.

Some Mentor/Rotarians are "veterans"; others are tenderfeet, following ideas from teachers as to how to proceed each school year. Mentors undergo a Background Check by the County Board of Education every two years. A Mentor, working with the teacher, sets his/her own day and hours. Retired, non-working Mentors enjoy more free time to visit the classroom; sometimes, those who work will miss a session but try to make it up wherever possible.

Up to 16 Mentor Rotarians serve weekly, in the classroom or with select students. Additionally small groups of students may attend Rotary lunch meetings. Mentors may also serve at action packed Field Day, fun for all, and the AB Merry choral group usually performs at Rotary before Christmas break Awards Days are special too. One recent year Rotarians pitched in to provide Christmas for two Merry students' homeless families. A very special bond often develops between the class and the Mentor.

Every year brings something new and always rewarding to each adult, and 2014-15 will be no different. Warm hallway greetings to Mentors ring out from last years students, rich payment of "love and hugs" from kids knowing that they're special.
