Swainsboro Rotarians were recently honored to have a program presented by Matthew Passauer, the new Head Baseball Coach for the East Georgia State College Bobcats. Passauer was invited to speak at the weekly meeting by Rotarian Dr. Bob Brown.

Passauer, an Erie, Pennsylvania native formerly worked as Pitching Coach and Recruiting Coordinator for EGSC during the 2013-14 baseball season. Before East Georgia, Passauer played collegiate baseball at the University of Maryland and Lee University. During his time at Lee, Passauer played a key role as a relief pitcher on the number one nationally ranked team, and competed in the College World Series two consecutive seasons.

Coach Passauer outlined the direction of EGSC baseball by starting with the mission. Building athletes with character, morals, values, and a service minded attitude are important to Passauer. The Coach emphasized the importance of involving athletes in community projects. He stressed how young athletes look up to college players and that they should be good role models. Youth baseball camps are being planned for later this spring and summer.

More than 100 people, including District Gov. Ted Thompson, AG Karl Bohnstedt, and District Foundation Chair Ron May; officials from the Chatham County Commission, Savannah City Council, and the Savannah Chatham County School Board; community leaders and supporters of the Savannah Early Childhood Foundation, gathered for the celebration at Southwest Chatham Branch of Live Oak Libraries.

The Savannah Early Childhood Foundation (SECF) is a non-profit grassroots effort supported by several Rotary Clubs in the Savannah area. The mission of SECF is to ensure that all Savannah children are ready for school. In partnership with Parent University and other community partners, SECF has developed and operates multi-session Early Learning College programs for parents in several neighborhoods throughout the city.

During the celebration, a new seven minute video featuring Savannah South Rotarians Thomas Hussey and Paul Fisher, a member of the Savannah South Board of Directors and President of the SECF was viewed. The evening also included a check presentation for \$3,660 from Savannah South to SECF. Over the past eight years, the Rotary Club of Savannah South has presented more than \$50,000 to the Savannah Early Childhood Foundation.

Claxton Rotarian Honored with Lincoln Award

Claxton Rotarian Britnee Kinard was in the national spotlight for her work and tireless determination on behalf of her husband, other veterans and their caregivers at a January 7 event held at the Kennedy Center for Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. Kinard was one of 10 recipients of the first annual Lincoln Awards, which attempt to recognize those who aid veterans.

Presented by the Friar Foundation, the award is based on President Lincoln's second inaugural address to the nation in which he concluded with the following statement: "With malice toward none, with charity for all ... to care for him who shall have borne the battle and for his widow and his orphan, to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace among ourselves and with all nations."



NBC's Nightly News Anchor Brian Williams said the event was "to honor those who answered that call."

The evening began with an award dinner attended by the honorees, their guests, high ranking members of the military, members of Congress and several celebrities who later participated in a concert. All award recipients were given the opportunity to speak.

Kinard accepted the Caregiver Award with humility and gratitude and spoke from the heart. She spoke of her shock in receiving the news of the award. Kinard had been in a nearly 18-month battle with the VA regarding the approval of mobility service animals. Gunner, her husband's service dog, is the first mobility animal approved in the Southeast Coastal region for South Carolina and Georgia.

Kinard also talked about the difficulties caregivers face.

"What we do is a 24/7 job. I do have a disabled husband and we

also have an autistic four-year-old son. We have a two-year-old son, and a furry son (referring to Gunner), so I have my hands full," she explained. "It's not every day that someone pats us (caregivers) on the back and says, 'thank you!'. So, I'm going to try not to get emotional. But, taking care of my husband and training others to do the same is a full-time job. It is exhausting but so worth the payoff. I hope that this recognition lets other caregivers know that you are not alone."

Following the dinner, a concert featuring Nick Jonas and Gavin DeGraw, among others, was held.
