Conference Fun for All



Reviving the Art of the "White Cooper"

The Fitzgerald Friendship Bucket is a hand crafted work utilizing the tools and craftsmanship of an art which is becoming forgotten. White Coopering was trade which made buckets for wet and dry goods. It is being revived here to create a collector's item along with helping to fund the Fitzgerald Rotary Club's efforts to vaccinate against Meningitis. For each bucket sold either fifty or one hundred-fifty dollars, depending upon which type of bucket, will be donated to this worthy cause. There are two types of bucket. The \$100 bucket is made of Cypress. The \$200 bucket is made from rescued Old Growth Heartwood Pine. These trees were many hundreds of years old when cut just at or more than one-hundred years ago. They were growing when Jamestown, Va., was settled.

By commissioning a bucket to be crafted, an individual will receive a bucket previously commissioned by an earlier supporter of this cause. Along with the bucket will come an information card to allow for an introduction and for a thank you card to be sent. This highlights half of the Friendship aspect, as the individual commissioning a bucket will also provide their contact information to accompany the next bucket crafted. It is encouraged that through these contacts, built on the mutual actions of complete strangers coming together to combat Meningitis, that lasting Friendships can be established.

So, for each Fitzgerald Friendship Bucket commissioned, an individual will be making a financial contribution, making two new friends, and become an owner of a piece of historical art all the while keeping a working knowledge of White Coopering alive.

A life may even be saved.

So far to date, \$1500 has been raised for this cause. Each year the local Health Dept. has just at fifty children whose parents are not able of pay the \$15 for the inoculation. This equates to \$750 a year. With the funds raised, Fitzgerald's Rotary Club has two years of vaccinations covered.

Reserve Deputy Carmichael coordinates Project Lifesaver Emanuel. Lifesaver is a tracking system to help quickly locate wandering persons (or those with a tendency to wander), especially those with Alzheimer's disease, dementia, and special needs children with Autism and Down Syndrome. Bill is not only a certified searcher for the program, but a certified trainer whose goal is to ensure that every investigator for Emanuel County is a certified searcher as well.

Having been a caregiver who experienced first hand the realities of Alzheimer's disease in his mother and both in-laws, Bill Carmichael is passionate in his efforts to provide this tracking service for those residents in Emanuel County.

Carmichael provided an overview and demonstration of the equipment utilized in the tracking process. The system can locate a person up to a mile away, day or night, inside or out. It provides rapid response efforts

to save lives and reduce the risks of serious injury.

4-Way Test or Rotary's Code of Ethics

The 4-Way Test contains only 33 words but these words are far reaching. They cover almost the entire gamut of interpersonal relationships.

- 1. *Is it the Truth?* Little white lies, bending the truth is so easy. It is one thing to lie about one's golf game or the number and sizes of fish caught. It is totally different to bend the truth in our profession. Important to remember that truth is truth. Truth is so important to our way of life, to our economy and our well-being that laws have been enacted, for example, requiring the truth in lending and advertising. Each witness in court is required to take an oath to tell the truth.
- 2. *Is it Fair to all Concerned?* It's been said, "Expecting the world to treat you fairly because you are a good person is like expecting the bull not to charge you because you are a vegetarian." Sometimes we want our way; we feel a need to come out on top. Egos can get into the way. Our place in this community, and as part of this club, does not represent privilege, but rather responsibility. Wherever we go, we represent something significant the value and ideals of this club and this community, and we should always be prepared to make the very best impression, regardless of the circumstances, so that everything will be fair to all concerned.
- 3. *Will it Build Goodwill and Better Relationships?* What we do, how we act, has a ripple effect. Our reputations, good or bad, travel around the community. So the standard of goodwill must be for everyone, rich or poor, young or old, long-time resident or newcomer and for new members as well as veteran members.
- 4. Will it be Beneficial to All Concerned? Who will benefit? How will it affect those not directly involved? How do we weigh the evidence in order to spread the benefits? Some decisions made concerning short-term needs may be inappropriate for long-term needs. Shortsightedness can damage long-term relationships. So it is important to weigh all the evidence in making sound, long-term decisions. And, knowing when to yield to others is important. Knowing when to change course can mean all the difference in the world.
